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4 Matters recommended for approval by the President, the action of  
5 the Board being indicated at the end of each item:

6  
7 **A. Conferment of the degree of Doctor of Humanities (honoris  
8 causa) on Camilo Jose Cela**

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10 The University Committee on Honorary Degrees at its  
11 meeting on 21 December 1998 recommended the conferment of  
12 an honorary degree, Doctor of Humanities, on Camilo Jose Cela in  
13 recognition of his distinguished literary contributions as a great  
14 Spanish writer. Cela's body of works demonstrates "the constant  
15 renewal of the techniques of the narrative and the skill in the  
16 control of language." He was awarded the Nobel Prize in Literature  
17 in 1989 for his "rich and intensive prose, which, with restrained  
18 compassion, forms a challenging vision of man's vulnerability."

19

23 **Discussion**

24  
25 While recognizing that the proposed conferment of honorary  
26 degree on Mr. Cela was fully deserved, Regent David  
27 nevertheless suggested that henceforth, the criteria applied in the  
28 screening process be appended to the recommendation to confer  
29 an honorary degree as a precaution against the probability of  
30 another Imelda Marcos receiving an honorary degree from the  
31 University.

32  
33 Vice President Caoili assured the regent that the Committee  
34 has been so strict in applying the criteria as to have turned down  
35 even requests from the Department of Foreign Affairs to honor  
36 visiting statesmen/dignitaries with such degrees.

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42 **B. U.P. Faculty Code of Ethics**

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44 **NOTE:** There were two versions presented for approval. The first  
45 was prepared by the President's Committee on Ethics and  
46 Values Education constituted in July 1995. This draft,  
47 which includes suggestions from the various autonomous  
48 universities, was favorably endorsed by all the units except  
49 U.P. Diliman.

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8 **C. U.P. Faculty Code of Ethics (cont'd)**

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10 The second draft, an abbreviated version written in  
11 English and Filipino, was approved by the U.P. Diliman  
12 University Council.

13  
14 The President recommended the adoption of both  
15 versions.

19 **Discussion**

20  
21 Following the brief background provided by the President,  
22 Regent David observed that the U.P. Faculty Code of Ethics is  
23 another list of injunctions upon the faculty on top of the other  
24 known and unknown rules governing the conduct of the faculty in  
25 the University. He wanted to know what purposes such a code  
26 was meant to serve, especially since some members of the faculty  
27 who were outvoted at the University Council meeting of Diliman  
28 where it was taken up perceived the proposed code as no more  
29 than a litany of "motherhood statements."

30  
31 The President explained that the proposed code was a  
32 faculty initiative. As a self-governing community of educated,  
33 enlightened, and accountable people, the faculty thought it should  
34 impose on its members a code of ethics they themselves worked  
35 out, as a way of relieving the apprehension among them that some  
36 of their colleagues have not been exactly true to their vocation; that  
37 some of them have been forgetful or sometimes remiss in their  
38 obligation as faculty members and as citizens of the Republic.

39  
40 Regent David opined that codes of ethics are normally  
41 drawn up by professionals or guilds, not by a University faculty  
42 already governed by a code of conduct. He did not see the need  
43 for another statute to make sure that the members of the faculty do  
44 their work beyond the code of conduct governing the performance  
45 of government officials.

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10  
11 Chancellor Llaguno recounted that the idea of a faculty code  
12 of ethics came up four years ago during the term of Chancellor  
13 Posadas who had in fact initiated it. To his knowledge, some past  
14 incidents precipitated the need for a committee to study the  
15 possibility of drawing up a faculty code of ethics for Diliman.  
16 However, it was only during the present administration, particularly  
17 after the matter was taken up in the faculty conference, that a  
18 committee was formed to formulate the code.

19  
20 Vice President Caoili cited the celebrated cases of the late  
21 Salvador Carlos and Professor Tapales as a turning point toward  
22 this initiative. She recalled that the 1995 Faculty Conference came  
23 up with a resolution urging the need for a systemwide faculty code  
24 of ethics to remind the faculty of how they should comport  
25 themselves. Thus President Javier's creation of a systemwide  
26 committee to work it out.

27  
28 A first draft prepared by U.P. Diliman, the Vice President  
29 further recounted, was sent to the university councils of the  
30 autonomous campuses for their consideration and inputs. It was  
31 returned to the committee thereafter where it went through several  
32 processes of refinement. After finding the refined draft acceptable,  
33 the President's Advisory Council sent it back to the Councils for  
34 approval. Five university councils approved the draft, but U.P.  
35 Diliman opted for an abbreviated version based essentially on the  
36 contents of the longer version.

37  
38 In reply to Regent Alfonso, the University General Counsel  
39 went on record that this Code of Ethics should not be construed as  
40 "another book to throw at the faculty" nor as a threat to them  
41 because there is always a presumption of good faith in the actions  
42 of members of the academe, particularly of U.P., and in the way  
43 they behave.

44  
45 Atty. Guno added that such a document does not merely  
46 relate to the matter of discipline which is just one of the concerns  
47 of her office, but in her opinion, also to the grant of promotions and  
48 tenure.

12 Regent Liban pointed out that since the Code of Ethics is a  
13 self-imposed code on the members of the faculty, the Board should  
14 only note it with appreciation and convey this action to the  
15 university councils. The objective behind the Code of Ethics, in his  
16 view, is to ennoble the profession of U.P. faculty members in  
17 keeping with the great traditions of the University, its practices, and  
18 its mission and vision as the leading institution of higher learning in  
19 the country.

20  
21 Taking the cue from Regent Liban, Regent Alfonso surmised  
22 that since the Code is a self-guiding, a self-enlightening, and a  
23 self-civilizing autonomous act of each autonomous university, each  
24 of them can tailor this Code of Ethics to its own peculiar situation  
25 and needs instead of having a common code of ethics approved by  
26 the Board. Vice President Caoili pointed out, however, that this  
27 Code of Ethics has already been adopted by five autonomous  
28 university councils and that in a sense their members are ready to  
29 comply with it.

30  
31 The Chairman upheld the Board's noting the Faculty Code  
32 of Ethics with appreciation. Regent David, however, insisted that  
33 the notation also convey the proviso that the items in this Code of  
34 Ethics should not be treated as another set of rules to be complied  
35 with by the faculty. President Javier objected, arguing that such a  
36 statement is unnecessary in view of its being a self-imposed code.

37 Regent David then requested that his dissenting opinion as  
38 a faculty regent be put on record on the ground that the faculty  
39 does not need anymore rules than those already contained in the  
40 code of conduct for government officials.
